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SPOTLIGHT: JOHN PHILIP EXCELLENCE IN OUTREACH AWARD

The John Philip Excellence in Outreach Award is given to recognize outstanding contributions and prominent leadership by an individual in bookmobile and outreach services. It is the highest recognition awarded in the outreach world. John Philip, known to all as "Mr. Bookmobile," spent his long and honorable career as an advocate of bookmobile and outreach services. Through his strong leadership and high-profile advocacy, bookmobiles have been recognized as a viable library outreach service. This award honors his dedication and tireless work and serves as a pinnacle for all bookmobile and outreach staff to aspire to.

Q: How long have you worked in outreach?
A: I have worked in outreach services for 4 ½ years, all of them at the St. Charles Public Library in St. Charles. IL.

Q: What is your favorite outreach service or activity?

A: My favorite outreach activity is coordinating and maintaining our Literacy Partners (book swaps and bins) at more than 50 locations in the community. Every day, I visit three or four locations (such as the local hospital, homeless shelter, or Meals on Wheels) dropping off withdrawn materials for individuals to take home and enjoy. I love the idea of reaching residents who might not normally visit our library in person.

Q: The John Philip Excellence in Outreach Award is the highest honor in the outreach world. Do you have anything in the planning stages for upping your outreach game?

A: Two new senior facilities are opening in our library district within the next year. I am excited about establishing partnerships with them and launching programming and material delivery tailored to their needs.

Q: How has ABOS made a difference to you and your work?

A: My team and I attribute so many of our current successful programs to ABOS. The 2015 Conference motivated us to launch programming at our senior facilities because we were inspired by Mary Beth Riedner's keynote lunch presentation. Programming is now one of the core services that we offer, and we entertain and engage with hundreds of seniors each month with our programs. I have learned so much vital information and practical knowledge because of participation in ABOS, the Conference, and from its individual members.

Q: What words of wisdom can you offer to those just starting out in the outreach field?

A: Statistics alone do not adequately represent what we do and how we reach residents. It's the stories we share, the hugs and smiles we receive, and day-to-day improvement in the quality of life that we offer our patrons and community. Remember that outreach services is about making an effective and positive difference. What we do in the community each day can change lives.

SPOTLIGHT: BERNARD VAVREK SCHOLARSHIP

Dr. Bernard Vavrek cofounded, along with John Philip, the Great American Bookmobile Conference, running it for many years until ABOS was formed. The \$1000 scholarship is awarded annually to a student who is currently enrolled and has completed at least one semester in a library and/or information science graduate degree program, and who is interested in the outreach field.

NATALIA MILES

Q: Where are you getting your MLS? When will you graduate?

A: I am attending San Jose State University in California; it's all done online, which is convenient, since I am presently living in southern Nevada. I will graduate in 2021.

Q: What sparked your interest in outreach services?

A: I have always loved bookmobiles since I experienced them as a little girl living in Long Barn, a tiny mountain village in northern California. The nearest library was too far away for us to visit regularly. The bookmobile seemed like something magical to me back then. Our little log cabin post office had three shelves of library books, and I had read them all pretty quickly. I lived for bookmobile visits! I was in heaven on the bookmobile; I would fill a laundry basket with books for my two sisters, my brother, and myself. I loved gazing at the rows and rows of books that took me to other destinations, worlds, and adventures. The bookmobile driver was so friendly; he made me feel so welcome. He would give us cookies that his wife made, and we would sit in little chairs that had wheels, and we read and read. He never rushed us.

Q: What do you hope to get out of the ABOS conference this year?

A: There are so many people to meet and so much to learn! I hope to meet people who love outreach and who love bookmobiles—people who are excited



about their work. I hope to make friends and professional connections. I would like to see what is new in outreach and how I can use this information in my coursework at SJSU.

Q: Any words of wisdom for those about to enroll in an MLS program?

A: Be prepared to devote a lot of time to your studies and become adept at APA formatting. Reach out to professors to ask questions about librarianship and their personal journeys to becoming librarians. They have inspiring stories to tell; in fact, their stories can motivate you to try harder.

OUTREACH GOES TO COLLEGE

In June 2018, I started working at a local state college. Prior to working for a college, I had worked in a small public library. My role in that library was cataloging and outreach. I was somewhat afraid of leaving a public library since I thought going to an academic institution meant that my outreach for libraries would come to an end. I have since learned that outreach has a different, but critical, role in academic libraries.

As an academic librarian at a state college, I have the opportunity to see students in their classrooms with their peers. Outreach extends beyond students though. Many of the professors learn more about the resources that the college offers by listening to library orientations. This isn't to say that outreach in college could not be better. Like any library, college libraries have room for improvement with outreach and much of it has to do with how we talk about what we do and what services we provide to our students.

Outreach extends beyond only public libraries. I actually let my membership to ABOS lapse this past year because I didn't think that what I was doing in my college was actually outreach. It is important for all library professionals to recognize the value of outreach and how we define outreach to ourselves and those we work with.

A NEW APPROACH TO MEASURING EARLY LITERACY SKILLS

In partnership with the Colorado Early Education Network (CEEN), the High Plains Library District (HPLD) implemented a new approach for collecting outcomes for early literacy skills for CEEN storytime services. Each month, HPLD provides 34 storytimes at 13 different sites within Weld County, Colorado. In 2015, HPLD began utilizing "Twinkle Babies" board book kits, to more fully engage tod-dlers and preschoolers.

The measurements are rooted in the opportunity the kits allow for each child to experience a book individually. Specific measurements are based on the students' ability to hold board books correctly—in an upright position—and turning the pages at the correct time in the story. Another Print Awareness pre-reading skill is measured as students return their books correctly with book spines facing outward. Other facets of literacies are assessed through observation in participation, measured by correct use of ASL during the welcome song and participation in physical literacy.

For the success of this approach, all CEEN storytimes require consistent use of Twinkle Babies kits and a specific welcome song. Each service must also include one element of physical literacy. Data are collected quantitively, and observations of two library staff members are conducted and recorded three times a year to track progress. HPLD intends to discover if CEEN storytime services truly cultivate early literacy skills when coupled with best practices. We are hopeful that our skill-based literacy storytimes prepare preschoolers for kindergarten. HPLD is excited to share this approach with likeminded colleagues and community partners to consider.


